Check your home's surroundings Determine whether trees need trimming-high winds can turn loose branches into dangerous projectiles and bring down powerlines. Also, if a storm approaches, secure outside furniture and move yard items indoors.	Prepare a first aid kit (or two) Better to be safe than sorry, so equip your home with a complete first aid kit. Check <i>RedCross.org</i> for a list of items to include.
Clean up after last year Use spring as an opportunity to remove any debris from your gutters, drains, spouts and roof to help those April showers drain smoothly off your home.	Have a family plan For spring storms and other natural disasters, create a list that includes an evacuation route, shelter location, communication plan and a way to receive emergency alerts, like weather alerts from AAA.
Test your sump pump Call a plumber to verify your sump pump is clean and draining properly in preparation for spring's downpours and drizzles.	Have a flashlight and weather radio Severe weather can strike any time of day, so keep a battery-operated flashlight and extra batteries within reach.
Test your smoke alarms Lightning and power outages raise the risk of fire. Check your fire alarms to make sure they're in good working order.	Stock up You may lose electric power or need to evacuate, so keep a three to five day supply of bottled water and nonperishable food, personal hygiene items, blankets, sleeping bags and medication.
Protect your electronics To help protect expensive electrical devices from damage during thunderstorms, you should plug them into surge protectors. If you don't have any, unplug your devices.	Replace worn-out weatherstripping Recaulk or replace weatherstripping around doors and windows for a better seal against high winds and flooding.
Keep essential information Have important telephone numbers on hand, such as those of friends, family and utility companies. Keep insurance, property, and medical information in a	Know your coverage Review your homeowners policy (it's free to do with AAA), and consider adding coverage extensions–like water backup or flood coverage.
